## Winning Impossible Battles

## II Chronicles 20

- I. First of all, turn your eyes to the Lord. "We do not know what to do, but our eyes are on you" (II Chronicles 20:1-13).
  - A. Allow your heart to be humbled before the Lord (II Chronicles 20:3-4, 12-13; Psalm 51:16-18; Isaiah 57:15; Jonah repented; Nineveh repented; and God relented. Jonah 2:7-10; 3:1-10; 4:1-4,11).
    - 1. Sometimes it takes time for our hearts to be conditioned.
    - 2. It is important to change whatever needs to be changed (Isaiah 58:3-4; Matthew 3:5-10).
  - B. Pray to your friend, Jesus (II Chronicles 20:5-9; John 15:15-16; Romans 8:31-32; Matthew 18:18-20).

## II. Make your battle the Lord's battle (II Chronicles 20:12-23).

- A. You always have power to conquer fear and discouragement and be strengthened by the Lord (II Chronicles 20:12-15; Isaiah 40:27-31—strength to the weary).
- B. Listen and look for your part in the battle. What have you left undone (II Chronicles 20:15-17)?
- C. Praise and thank God for his goodness (II Chronicles 20:18-23).
  - 1. Praise and thanksgiving stir the Lord to battle for you (II Chronicles 20:18-23).
  - 2. God gives a new song to sing, strength to the weary, and opens prison doors (Psalm 40:1-3; Isaiah 40:27-31; Acts 16:22-40).
  - 3. A new song is symbolic of embracing a new attitude toward God to change the season of your life (Philippians 4:4-7; I Thessalonians 5:16-18—God's will in difficult circumstances).

## III. Enjoying the plunder (II Chronicles 20:22-30).

- A. One outcome from winning difficult battles can be overwhelming blessings. (II Chronicles 20:22-25; Isaiah 35:3-4; Job 42:12-17—double for Job's trouble).
- B. Impossible battles are for God's glory. Sometimes we get deceived by the intensity of the battle.
  - 1. A new place of praise (Berakah), worship, and celebration (II Chronicles 20:26-28)
  - 2. A testimony to the world of God's greatness (II Chronicles 20:29-30)
  - 3. "And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28).
